Miami wreck trek

Saturday, August 24, 7:30 AM
Miami

Join us for a spectacular dive adventure on the shallow wrecks offshore Miami. We will be diving off the 50-foot "Nautilus" diveboat, and departing from the Sealine Marina, located at the Marriot Hotel behind the old Omni, at 555 NE 16th Street.

Conditions permitting, we plan on diving the "wreck trek." Divers can start with the wreck of the Patricia, a 65-foot steel tug, and then navigate around the circuit by following markers in the sand. From the Patricia, we can swim counterclockwise to an underwater battlefield, which includes two M60s and a 1,000-ton mass of limerock boulders. Crevices in these boulders harbor banded coral shrimp, spiny lobster, juvenile moray eels and many tropical reef fish. The next stop is Billy's Barge, a 100-foot, low-profile wreck surrounded by 360 tons of concrete pipe. The third stop, Ben's Antennae Reef, consists of sections of discarded radio towers, pyramiding 20 feet from the shore bottom. From the pyramids, we can pass over the wreckage of a shrimp boat to the fourth stop, Miss Karline, an 85-foot-long steel-hulled vessel with a 15-foot profile.

Directions: Take Biscayne Blvd to NE 15th Street. Head East on NE 15th. Turn left on North Bayshore drive. There is a side street with a church parking lot on the right, and the Marriott is on your left. Take a right heading east and you will see the dock and boat. Unload your gear and then park across the street in the Omni parking lot.

And one of the things our new Bylaws now require is a year-end report by the President, informing the membership of the general health and condition of the Club, the financial picture, our successes and our failures. Personally, in the past, I felt that there was a lack of accountability to the membership. This let us slip much too close to the edge of brink, without you, the member, having a clue. Last year, it was my pleasure to give you a very detailed report on our condition, the first such report in our thirty-four year history. If we stick with the current Bylaws, these reports should become an annual staple. Over the past two years, we made our best effort to keep you informed, not just giving you the good, but also the bad and the ugly, which will inevitably be a part of the picture from time to time. By keeping you fully informed, we hope to make you more involved with the Club and to raise your voice, when you feel things are not going well.

I can only hope that you will read on, as I am truly proud and excited about what I have to report to you. I will try to be factual and objective, refraining from excessive chest beating, as tempting as that may be at times. And as always, I sincerely welcome your comments, as we never have enough feedback.

YEAR IN REVIEW. To borrow from the ancient Arabic curse, it certainly was an interesting year. Of course, we refer to our fiscal year, which ran from June 1, 2001 to May 31, 2002. We started out like gangbusters, coming off a year which saw us recover from the previous year's deficit and ending up with a surplus, increased membership, great trips in store and a lot of enthusiasm. The picnic had a record turnout of 166 people who bought over one third of the available trip spaces within a few hours of them going on sale. That on top of Japan and China, which had already sold out months earlier, also within hours of being offered. In short, about half of our total trip spaces were spoken for by the end of the picnic, and things were looking mighty good. All summer, we were on a roll, looking to expand some of the trips to satisfy demand, and attendance at events was at an all time high. And then came September 11. As those events devastated the nation, the Club suffered as well. Not only was the enthusiasm below freezing point, but no one signed up for any trip at all for months; no one joined the Club. And then the cancellations started to come in and things went from bad to worse. Our projections and budget headed for the waste can and we went into survival mode. Our trip leaders and the Board doubled their efforts to turn things around and we returned to the drawing board to crunch numbers, negotiate with vendors for extensions and make the best of the situation. And it worked.

TRIPS were our major concern, because of the huge financial exposure. Our margins are very tight, and the liabilities potentially large, so the budgeting and planning has to be very good to make things work. Fortunately, we were conservative in projecting the number of skiers for last year, and in the end it paid off. Most of our trips managed to fill to an acceptable level toward the very end (talk about sweating it out), and by the time everything was said and done, the only trip we lost money on was Cortina. To put things into perspective, most other Florida Ski Council clubs cancelled out of that trip all together, however we have made a commitment to our membership as well as the FSC, and the decision was to go ahead with the trip, even at a loss. Frankly, the cancellation fees incurred would have amounted to about the same, had we cancelled. In the end, overall we were down only by 11 skiers from the year before. But wait, were we? Funny things, those statistics - there is always room for interpretation. The year before, we had a two-week trip to two destinations in Europe (Chamonix and Zermatt), and each trip counted separately, so those people who went on both, counted twice. This year, we had the Japan and China trip, which we counted only once. Consequently, if we treated them as separate trips, we would have ended up with 35 more skiers than the year before! But that's not the whole story yet. On top of the Keys Weekend (where we don't provide transportation, and therefore don't consider as a trip), we had the Bahamas adven-

ture, and the very successful New Orleans trip (with 37 people). By that account, we actually took 88 more people traveling! Fancy math aside, we have done a terrific job with our trips, now matter how you slice it!

Our **FINANCES** have also done remarkably well. As of this writing, there are still some pending fiscal issues, particularly with a couple of trips, so we don't have exact dollars and cents to give you yet. But it looks like we can have a surplus in the neighborhood of \$20,000 this year. Needless to say, that is a very large number. So where did all that money come from? The answer would have to be "from everywhere!" In the past, we had basically two sources of income: memberships and trips. These last two years we have expanded on that a bit. Not to sell it short, our memberships did account for a good portion of the income (more on that subject later). Some trips barely broke even, but other trips have expanded enough to generate an additional comp that was not budgeted, which translates into pure gravy for the Club. We have also had two trips (Argentina and New Orleans) go out with trip leaders paying their own way, with their comp going directly to the Club. A substantial contribution to our treasury, needless to say. The Bahamas trip also went out without a trip leader comp.

Our finances have been judiciously managed, with the bulk of the funds earning income. We now have a very solid cash reserve, which is generating revenues for us as well. Another, less obvious source of revenue, is the special events. On most of them, we only make one or two dollars max per person, but the quantity of these events has grown so much, that at the end of the day, all these little dollars add up. Advertising sales have helped quite a bit as well. The ads in the Newsletter help offset the printing costs, but the Magazine revenues exceeded the printing costs, with the surplus supporting the Newsletter production. But once again, one of the truly major savings came from the volunteer work, with just about everything being done in house. For example, all the mailings are done by the Board, the entire magazine was produced at no cost to the Club (other than the actual printing), the new signs were done by us for just the cost of materials, most of the meals at Board meetings were cooked by the host for a token fifty bucks, and so on. In short, a lot of the people on the Board and EC have pitched in, without looking to the Club for compensation. And that amounted to a lot.

MEMBERSHIP is perhaps one of the greatest victories we can claim. After many, many years of declining numbers, 2000-2001 saw us bring the membership up from near extinction, and by the end of that year, we had increased our ranks by about 10% over 1999 - 2000. Truly an amazing feat, given the circumstances. After September 11, we were only hoping to be able to hold those numbers. But things started picking up, and the 2001 - 2002 membership data is in. Get this:

we have actually *increased* our membership again, but this time by over **22%** from the previous year! That's double the growth of the year before! That makes for one hell of a trend, and I can't tell you how happy that makes me. While we are on the subject, a lot of effort went into encouraging early renewals. I wish everyone would renew their membership on time, but most people seem to let their memberships lapse, and then renew during the year. At this point in time, only a couple of weeks into the 2002 - 2003 year, we have about half of our members renewed. That seems like a rather pathetic number (it *is* a pathetic number), but historically speaking, that is very high. This means that we are starting the year with a fairly solid base of well over three hundred members, which is very good.

Another major objective was to put a **NEW FACE** on the ol' Miami Ski Club. At the end of the two years, we have pretty much succeeded. Just look around - new trip signs, all new forms, new web site, new Newsletter, new stationary, new banner, expanded magazine, new Club shirts, new name badges, you name it. The only thing still not in place is the automated phone system. All those changes are mainly cosmetic, but they reflect the sense of professionalism, which we tried to bring into the Club. Things like leaving phone calls unanswered, or not having the Newsletter on time are simply not an option any more. This carries over to how we deal with our vendors, maintain our finances, how we run trips, and so on. But most of all, it is reflected in the level of enthusiasm we have seen for two years now. And that's invaluable.

An equally important objective was to truly make this a Club for all who want to participate. Being where I am, this is perhaps impossible for me to judge objectively, but we are making a constant effort to make everyone feel welcome and not give the impression of "cliquishness". I hope that you feel we have succeeded on that count. That also brought in a very serious attempt to do away with sandbox politics. To paraphrase one of my favorite movies, this Club had suffered tremendously by a great political upheaval some years back, only to be followed by a dark period of serious downheaval. I believe that we have managed to have a two year period of no heaval at all. And that's the way it should be.

What else? Well, we have been awarded the Ski Club of the Year award by the Florida Ski Council for the improvements made in our Club, and we have won the FSC Challenge Cup trophy in NASTAR racing. We have tremendously expanded our list of trips and activities, and we promise to do more. But most of all, we have had a lot of fun, have made a lot of friends, and we have made sure that we'll be around for a while longer for others to enjoy. I hope that you have benefited from all the good things the Club has to offer.
